Attendance

In 2022, the average attendance of students at Harvey PS reflected the downward trend experienced across the South-West Region. It is acknowledged that the pandemic has had an on-going impact again in 2022, with the Harvey town site being majorly affected. A regional strategy is being developed to support a reversal of the trend. Of concern, in 2022, is the significant increase in the number of students at risk due to their attendance rate. The school continues to review each of these students on a case by case basis and seeks to provide support based on the specific needs of each child.

SCHOOL LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Pastoral Care

2022 continued to present challenges related to the anxiety many children and adults have in relation to the on-going pandemic. Staff have a heightened awareness, particularly of student mental and emotional well-being and pastoral care has been a constant focus.

We pride ourselves on a whole-school approach for acknowledging and supporting students, staff and community members through our Pastoral Care initiatives.

Well-embedded into our school community are our Five Virtues - Caring, Respect, Courage, Courtesy and Integrity, which are taught and reinforced at all opportunities. These, along with our school expectations, have had an increased focus throughout the 2022 school year to promote positive behaviour choices.

We continue to use Highway Heroes as our social/emotional program. Highway Heroes uses the metaphor of the highway to describe the journey everyone takes through life, with primary school being one of the first destinations. Along the highway there are times where we need to slow down, which is defined as a bump, and times where we need to stop, perhaps even get some help, known as a hazard. Defining events in life's journey in this way has helped our students.

Kristi Crognale joined Harvey PS as our school chaplain and set about establishing strong links with our students, staff and families. Kristi supported a number of our students and their families and offered them support and general assistance throughout the year.

Behaviour Management

Student behaviour at Harvey PS is supported by our whole school behaviour strategies that include our minor and major referrals, while at the same time focusing on our positives that include class and whole school rewards as well as our student Good Standing Policy. These provide clear guidelines for students, promote personal responsibility and provide a framework for all staff when counselling students regarding their behaviour. In 2023, we will be introducing more whole school positive incentives.

NAPLAN 2022 Student Achievement and Progress

NAPLAN was again conducted in 2022, after it was cancelled in 2020. The results provide a snapshot of student academic performance, with both achievement and progress able to be reviewed. Our focus at Harvey Primary School is to value add to each child's learning. Our 2022 NAPLAN results confirm that our students are continuing to achieve to a high standard as well as making significant progress and achievement between Year 3 and Year 5.

Our comparative performance against like schools shows that we are achieving what is expected of our students, with some areas highlighted in green meaning we are achieving above the expected outcomes.


